Gemini Weave Astrology Bracelet



For Supplies, You Will Need Approximately:


- 6' (2m) Air Force 550 Paracord
- 6' (2m) Electric Blue and Neon
 Pink Stripes 550 Paracord
- 5/8" Pink Side-Release Buckle
- A Scissors, Lighter, Lacing Needle, and Jig
- A Knotter's Tool (Optional)
- A Lacing Needle (Optional)



 Adjust your jig to fit the distance around your wrist plus about 1"
 (2.5cm) and attach the buckle.




2. Make a fold about a foot into the Electric Blue and Neon Pink Stripes (EBNPS) strand.



3. At the top of the jig, pass EBNPS down through the front of the buckle.



4. Pass the running ends through the fold and pull tight to make a cow hitch knot.



5. Do the same with Air Force.



6. At the bottom of the jig, pass the right EBNPS running end down through the front of the buckle.



7. Pass it over the new core strand with the running end facing the inside of the bracelet.



8. Pass the running end up through the back of the buckle on the inside of the bracelet.




9. Pass the running end under the bite you just created and pull tight.




10. Do the same with your left Air Force running end.




11. Trim the ends.



12. Heat them with a lighter for 3-6 seconds and flatten the ends with a knotter's tool or the bottom of your lighter.




13. At the top of the jig, pass EBNPS over the two core strands.




14. Then bring it up through the core center, above the pass you just made.


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
15. Using the same strand, pass it over the core, up through the center, and above the pass you just made once more.




16. Now do the same thing with Air Force.



17. You will always make two knots with each strand before switching colors. Continue this pattern until you reach the bottom of the core.



18. At the bottom, trim Air Force about ¼" away from the weave and melt the end with a lighter flame for 3 to 6 seconds.



19. Use a knotter's tool or the bottom of your lighter to flatten the melted Air Force end and bond it to the weave.




20. Trim the EBNPS running end at an angle.



21. Melt the EBNPS end with a lighter for 3 to 6 seconds.



22. Line it up with the bottom of your lacing needle and twist clockwise until firmly attached.



23. Lace the needle over EBNPS, down through the core center.



24. Unclip the bracelet from your jig and trim the EBNPS end about ¼" away from the weave.



25. Use a lighter to melt the freshly trimmed EBNPS end for 3 to 6 seconds.



26. Again, use a knotter's tool or the bottom of your lighter to flatten the melted EBNPS end and bond it to the weave.



Born from May 21st to June 20th, this air sign is very talkative and curious. In Greek mythology, the Gemini constellation represents a set of twins.

For this weave, we were inspired by the Blaze of Glory tutorial by @SlayerParacord on Instagram because it features a two-color, twostrand core and mirrored pattern on each side.

We also chose these colors because they are bright and cheerful like this chatty sign.

If you look closely, EBNPS is made up of two different thread colors to show Gemini's sudden indecisiveness, which can come from their fear of being bored and desire to explore many options.
